This past year we faced unprecedented challenges that none of us could have anticipated. Harvesters had to quickly increase our efforts to alleviate hunger in the face of job loss and reduced incomes. So many people who've never struggled financially were suddenly facing hunger.

Harvesters was able to respond quickly and efficiently only because of your support. We added 60 mobile food distributions and hosted two "mega" distributions at Arrowhead Stadium and in Kansas City, Kan., to provide 16,500 people with nutritious food.

It's difficult to put into words what your partnership has meant to your neighbors and to our team. We give thanks for you every day. And the countless people — those who've lost work, who live in constant fear for their own and their loved ones' health, who struggle to reach out for help after living so independently — are so truly grateful you chose to give. You've shared so much food and so much hope through your partnership.

This report is a thoughtful reflection on what you've made possible. It's a display of our community's strength, resilience and character. Harvesters has only been able to stand in the face of the pandemic because people like you care so much about your neighbors.





- 26 schools participated in Harvesters' School Pantry program, which provided full-size grocery items and fresh produce to children and families in need.
- Our Kids Cafe program provided 186,528 after school and summer meals to children across 86 sites.





- With your help, we provided more than 57 million meals to foodinsecure families in northeastern Kansas and northwestern Missouri.
- Harvesters distributed nearly 66 million pounds of food through our network of more than 760 partner agencies.
- Harvesters operated 232 mobile food distributions each month through 225 agencies.
- Harvesters' SNAP Outreach Team helped provide 2.5 million meals through our SNAP Outreach program and Call Center.





- Through the USDA Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), Harvesters provided more than 1.8 million meals to seniors in need.
- We operated 66 Senior Mobile Food Distributions, which brought more than 1 million pounds of fresh produce and other nutritious food to convenient senior sites throughout our service area.
- Harvesters' Produce Bus in Topeka, Kansas (a donated Topeka Metro Bus) served 13 pantries and senior sites each month and distributed 111,452 pounds of fresh produce.





- Harvesters distributed more than 21 million pounds of fresh produce, nearly one-third of our total pounds distributed.
- Through the Milk2MyPlate Program (a dairy purchase program in partnership with Hiland Dairy), Harvesters provided 59,537 units of dairy (milk, yogurt, and cottage cheese) to partner agencies across our service area.
- Harvesters partnered with 30
  healthcare organizations on
  programs such as food insecurity
  screenings for patients at health
  clinics and "pop-up" food pantries
  for patients to access health-oriented
  foods at their doctor's appointments.



# YOU'RE HELPING Provide Freezency Relief

None of us could have predicted what this year had in store. As we take a moment to reflect, we know our emergency response would not have been possible without you.

"It was very easy, smooth and very well organized in my opinion," says Jonnisha, who visited Harvesters' distribution at Arrowhead in May. "The food was everything we needed. It really helped."

Your gifts have enabled us to provide relief in the form of healthy food to thousands of people who would otherwise be experiencing hunger. Jonnisha was especially worried about keeping her family safe. Her husband has asthma, and her son has diabetes. She pulled her kids out of school back in March a few days before the lockdown began.

Jonnisha's husband works as a contractor with a local utility company, and his hours were cut when the pandemic began. She stays home with their 2-year-old because of the high cost of childcare. With the loss of income, her family has been struggling to afford even basic expenses.

That's why Jonnisha is so thankful she learned about Harvesters' Arrowhead Stadium distribution on Facebook. Your support has been a true lifeline.


"Thank you for being there in the community for those of us who don't know where our next meal would come from," Jonnisha says. "I greatly appreciate it."

- Harvesters provided nearly 2 million meals through the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program (CFAP), a federal program operated through the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which ensured we had plenty of produce, dairy, and other nutritious items to distribute.
- Harvesters distributed 25,806,752 pounds of food from March to June 2020, nearly 7 million more pounds than we distributed during that same period in 2019.
- To safely and effectively reach our clients, we added 60 additional drive-thru mobile distributions, which allowed for the safe distribution of food with limited person-to-person contact. These included 2 "Mega Mobile" distributions in Kansas City, Kan. and at Arrowhead Stadium which served 16,500 people impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.
