Throughout another challenging year, your generous partnership with Harvesters—The Community Food Network helped provide vital, nutritious food for countless children, families and seniors in our community.

The ongoing uncertainty of COVID-19 and economic instability in the pandemic's wake have been discouraging to say the least. But your willingness to unite with neighbors in support of one another serves as a bright beacon of hope.

While the pandemic continued to disrupt the food supply chain in 2021, your partnership allowed Harvesters to purchase significantly more food to counteract this challenge and still meet the critical need for food.

We also added nearly 100 new partner agencies in 2021, helping make sure that people in every corner of our service area have regular access to healthy food. We operated 232 monthly mobile distributions and 60 one-time or occasional distributions in partnership with our agency network this year.

YOU'RE FEEDING *Families*

Samantha and her husband are both pediatric nurses and were working at a local children's hospital. But at the beginning of the pandemic, Samantha was laid off and her husband's hours were cut in half. They began having trouble making their mortgage payments and fell behind on their bills.

"Things definitely got really tight," Samantha says.

Making sure her kids have healthy food is Samantha's top priority. While Annabelle, 8, doesn't have any food restrictions, Lincoln, 1, has severe food allergies.

"Any little mess-up [with Lincoln's diet] is disastrous," Samantha explains.

Thanks to your generosity, the family could pick up food from the food pantry at Kansas City Kansas Community College when they needed groceries. The food pantry has been accommodating of Lincoln's special dietary needs. If Samantha ends up with an item Lincoln is allergic to, she can bring it back in exchange for fresh fruits and vegetables that Lincoln can tolerate.

"Without Harvesters, [we] would have been eating rice and beans every day," she says, thanking generous donors like you.

- **With your help, we provided 67,885,565 meals to food insecure families in northeastern Kansas and northwestern Missouri.**
- **Harvesters added 100 new partner agencies in locations of immediate need.**
- **310 truckloads of food, at a cost of approximately \$800,000 a month, were purchased to ensure there was enough food available to agencies working to meet increased need. Fewer volunteers and reduced availability of donated food due to COVID-19 increased the need to purchase food.**

YOU'RE FEEDING *Children*

Eight-year-old Hyrum tends to be on the shy side, but he looks forward to his visits to Harvesters' Kids Cafe at the Trails West Branch of the Kansas City Public Library. There, Hyrum and his siblings not only receive nutritious food, but also a chance to socialize throughout the pandemic.

"We're social creatures," the kids' mother, Cherene, says of the importance of the visits.

The afterschool and summer feeding program, sponsored by Harvesters, began offering grab-and-go food after the pandemic began. That gave Hyrum and his siblings, Emma, 6, Lucy, 4 and Zula, 2, an opportunity to both receive nutritious food and visit with other people at the Kids Cafe, all while staying a safe distance from one another.

One of Hyrum's favorite people to visit just happens to be Nancy, the librarian in charge of youth and family engagement.

"After we started going, we'd stay outside and chat and update Miss Nancy on what we were doing," Cherene says.

The kids continue to look forward to their visits to the library, where their favorite foods include peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, cheese sticks, fruit cups and more.

- **The BackSnack program served 8,700 children throughout the year.**
- **Harvesters' Kids Cafe program provided 67,576 meals at 60 sites.**
- **Approximately 562,784 meals were provided through 10 High School Mobile Pantries.**

YOU'RE FEEDING *Seniors*

George loves talking about food. He learned to cook at an early age, took courses in the culinary arts later in life and even ran a café. Thanks to friends like you, he has regular access to fresh produce and other healthy groceries even when his pantry is bare.

George, 65, is a retired Army sergeant who earned two bronze stars during his term of duty. Since retirement, he stays busy helping his family, working out at the gym and even volunteering his time at Harvesters.

George says he can “count on one hand” the number of times he has needed food through Harvesters, but he’s thankful to know where to go when his supply is low. He recently cooked up a steak dinner with peppers and zucchini he received from a Harvesters mobile distribution at Union Station.

“I just like what you guys do,” he says of your generosity. “It’s really nice.”

Because you choose to give, George never goes without the food he needs to thrive.

- **Harvesters packed and distributed more than 5,000 boxes of food for seniors each month through the USDA Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) - more than 1,976,911 pounds of food.**
- **Harvesters operated 56 Senior Mobile Food Distributions each month.**
- **Harvesters submitted 428 SNAP applications for households with a senior living in the home.**

YOU'RE ENCOURAGING *Good Health*

"I feel like I eat better with Harvesters."

Joann, 74, is just one of the many people in our community who benefited from SNAP's COVID-19 Emergency Allotments. For a limited time, her monthly SNAP benefit increased from just \$16 to \$178.

Joann has used the extra benefit to stock up on canned goods and frozen items. But even with the notable increase in SNAP benefits, Joann says she wouldn't be able to purchase the costlier but healthier groceries that are best for her health.

"There's lot of things I couldn't get without Harvesters, like fresh fruit, meat and cheese," she says. "Those last two are really expensive items."

Joann has a heart condition and high blood pressure, so she's especially grateful to boost her health with nutritious food.

- **35% of total food distributed in 2021 was fresh produce.**
- **Through the Milk2MyPlate Program (a dairy purchase program in partnership with Hiland Dairy), Harvesters provided 102,258 units of dairy (milk, yogurt, and cottage cheese) to partner agencies across our service area.**
- **Multiple local hospital systems are now screening people for food insecurity, along with other social determinants of health, and referring people in need to Harvesters' network of agency partners where they can access groceries for their families.**

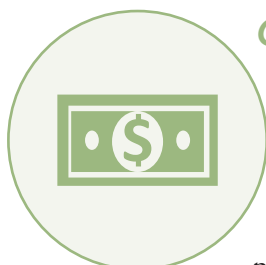

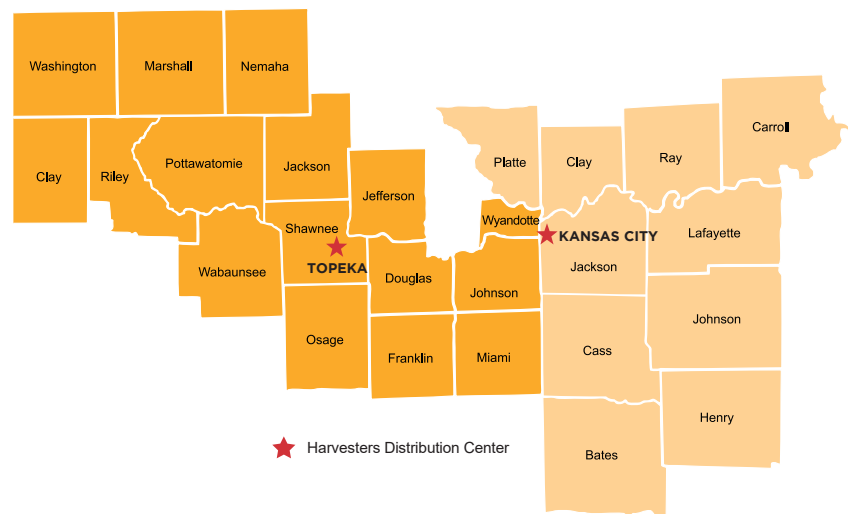
GIVE TIME
